PRAY WITH AN ABUNDANCE OF HOPE

In 2018, my in-laws entered the care-taking season of their lives, beginning with permanently welcoming a parent into their home. In preparation for this bittersweet chapter, my mother-in-law matched each bedroom with a biblical name for God. Names like Jehovah Rohi, El Shaddai, Jehovah Jirah now mount the door frames. The cohesive design of each room mirrors the name and engulfs occupants with a distinct impression of God's character, often producing an acute desire to learn more about that aspect of God. One of these names is Miqweh Yisrael or "The God of hope."

Why is he called the God of hope? In Romans 15:13, Paul uses this title to point out that we can hope in God because he makes promises and he keeps them (Ro. 15:8). You know that feeling of security when you can trust someone to do what they say? When you know a fellow laborer for Christ wouldn't dream of letting you down unless the world was literally at an end? Paul's prayer is marked with an abundance of hope because he knew something we tend to forget: God always keeps his promises.

As you pray today, call upon God's promises and abound in hope; he will keep them. Begin here: Matthew 11:28-29, 2 Corinthians 12:9, Isaiah 40:31, and Romans 8:28. Build your life on these promises and experience renewed joy and peace in Christ.

GOD'S TRIUMPH IN THE WORLD

"You have taught children and infants to proclaim your strength; thus you have silenced your enemies and all who oppose you."

God's greatest triumph in the world is humanity's vulnerability. It is the awareness of not living up to expectations. While testosterone-fueled men retreated in fear, God raised up among them a small, faithful woman: Deborah.

Among so many experienced soldiers, it was through David's heart that God chose to demonstrate his strength and precision. He took on the great battle but rejected the armour he could not carry.

When the twins Esau and Jacob were born, it was the younger who was chosen to rule over the older, because God chose the least expected one. He is the one who prays, 'I will not let you go until you bless me.'

God the Son became as tiny as an egg and taught us true humanity when he showed himself to be tired and cried out, 'I am thirsty!'

He could have done everything alone, but he chose to include us. Just as a father delights in his baby's first words, simply for the pleasure of being together, so does the Lord show himself to us as we offer our best and stumble through our worst.

So, the question remains: where is your vulnerability taking you? Will you hide behind your achievements, gifts and intelligence, or will you bring your weakness, fear, inadequacies and guilty pleasures to God in search of transformation? Our vulnerability is not an accident; but an invitation to form relationships.

TO LEARN LAMENT

I am a person who "looks on the bright side of life." I live and serve with enthusiasm, expectancy, and anticipation. I tend to speak of my life from the perspective of the joys, positive outcomes, and bright hopes for tomorrow. This is also how I cope with life and ministry. Some of you may relate.

In the study of God's Word and in learning to pray for others in great need, sorrow, and grief, God's Spirit has taught me to understand Lament. I've come to see that to live deeply and intimately with my Heavenly Father means to acknowledge and express my sorrows. The Psalms give me words to ponder when I tend to make light of my hardships, fears, and sadness.

Psalm 6:2-3

Have mercy on me, Lord, for I am faint; heal me, Lord, for my bones are in agony.

My soul is in deep anguish. How long, Lord, how long?

As I ponder these verses, I begin to notice the faintness and anguish within my soulwwwww As this awareness grows, I allow myself to weep and cry out. And God meets me here and shows Himself in a deeper way.

Mark Vroegop, in his article "Why Missionaries Need to Be Fluent in Lament," speaks to my tendency. He says, "Instead of allowing the pressures of ministry to create despair or a stoic denial, lament invites us to talk to God with all the messiness and grit required for perseverance."

Let's learn the language of lament.

GOD LOOKS YOU STRAIGHT IN THE EYE

This ancient priestly blessing holds a special place in my heart because my father often reminded us that the phrase, "the Lord turns His face to you," means that God looks us straight in the eye—not in judgement but rather in love, as "the apple of His eye," one in whom He delights. It is usually so much easier for me to see how God is disappointed in me rather than to see and believe that He delights in me. The prayer that "His face would shine on you and be gracious to you" is a prayer that His holiness, truth and love shine on me, so that through His unmerited kindness (grace!), I would be forgiven and transformed to reflect Him. This blessing is a prayer for intimacy with God our Father who cares for us, forgives us, delights in us, and transforms us. Dwelling in that intimacy gives us deep peace.

It was fitting that, on the occasion of my parents' 50th wedding anniversary, my father prayed this blessing over each of the grandchildren individually, holding up their faces and looking at them straight in the eye.

Today, draw near to God and let His face shine on you. Imagine your Heavenly Father looking you straight in the eye. What is He saying to you?

Ponder: What breath prayer do you often repeat? A breath prayer is a Bible phrase that helps you focus on God in the moment. You intentionally speak this phrase to remind yourself that God is God and He is here.

Scripture

At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon during the night in a dream, and God said, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you." Solomon answered, "You have shown great kindness to your servant, my father David, because he was faithful to you and righteous and upright in heart. You have continued this great kindness to him and have given him a son to sit on his throne this very day." Now, Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David. But I am only a little child and do not know how to carry out my duties. Your servant is here among the people you have chosen, a great people, too numerous to count or number. So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?"

1 Kings 3:5-9

What do you know about this person's situation when they are praying this? What does this prayer mean for the person praying? What phrase in their prayer stands out for you? Can this be a breath prayer for you?

WISDOM FOR WHAT GOD ENTRUSTS TO US

When God appeared to Solomon and said, "Ask for whatever you want," Solomon didn't seize the moment for personal gain. Instead, he recognized his own inadequacy and asked for wisdom to lead well. That humility still moves me. Before requesting anything, Solomon acknowledged God's faithfulness to his father and the weight of the responsibility placed on him.

I often think of that moment when I face tough decisions. Leadership isn't about having all the answers; it's about turning to God when you don't. True wisdom isn't mere knowledge - it is the real- life application of the Word of God.

God gives wisdom through many channels: through His Word, through the quiet prompting of His Spirit, through experience that trains discernment, and through the counsel of the wise. Yet even with wisdom, obedience remains essential. Solomon's story reminds us that wisdom left unheeded still leads astray.

"But the wisdom from above is first of all pure. It is also peace-loving, gentle at all times, and willing to yield to others. It is full of mercy and the fruit of good deeds. It shows no favoritism and is always sincere."

James 3:17 Prayer:

Lord, help us to recognize our need for Your wisdom in all You've entrusted to us. Teach us to listen, to obey, and to walk humbly in Your ways - so that our decisions reflect Your heart and bring life to others.

A STORY ONLY GOD COULD WRITE

We praise God for His faithfulness—for never letting go, and for continuing the work He begins in each of us. In His mercy, He not only redirects our steps but reshapes our desires to align with His. Seasons that felt like loss became sacred surrender. Waiting became the soil where transformation took root.

We've seen this most clearly in the lives of the teachers at our school where we had the joy of walking with them. Many arrived overlooked or underestimated by the world's standards. But God, in His wisdom, saw their true potential. Through prayer, intentional investment, and their own willingness to grow, they were transformed—becoming grounded, confident, and equipped. One teacher shared, "Thank you for giving me wings to fly." Another said, "I'm thankful for where your guidance has placed me today." These are more than kind words—they are testimonies. Only God could write stories like these.

When our school unexpectedly closed, we were devastated. But God's work didn't stop. Those same teachers are now leading and influencing excellence in new places, carrying the DNA of transformation into other communities. What was never part of our plan was always part of God's greater purpose—to expand His kingdom.

This is why we return to prayer: In prayer, we remember that God is not done. He is still shaping, still calling, and still completing what He started. And so, we praise Him—with joy, gratitude, and open hands for all that's still to come

FAITHFUL TO THE END

"I always thank my God for you because of his grace given you in Christ Jesus..." (v.4)

Paul begins his letter with gratitude, not for the Corinthians' perfection, but for the grace of God at work in them. This grace is the foundation of their identity and calling. Verse 8 offers a powerful assurance: "He will sustain you to the end, guiltless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ." Our security is not in our performance but in God's sustaining grace. And why can we trust this promise? Because "God is faithful" (v.9). He has called us into fellowship with His Son, and He will never abandon what He has begun in us.

I have had moments of doubt in my ability to serve God's people since I have shortcomings as a person. So, are you weary or feeling unworthy? Take heart—God's grace is active in you, His gifts are present in you, and His faithfulness will carry you through.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, Thank You for Your unshakable faithfulness. Thank You for the grace You have poured into my life through Christ Jesus. Even when I feel weak or unworthy, You remind me that You are the One who sustains me. Lord, help me to walk in the gifts You've given me—not for my glory, but for Yours. Teach me to trust in Your promise to keep me guiltless until the day of Christ. Strengthen my heart to remain in fellowship with You, knowing that You are always near.

THE LORD OUR KEEPER

Psalm 121 is a pilgrim's song of trust—a reminder that our security does not rest on the hills of human strength but in the unfailing presence of God. The psalmist begins with a question of dependence and ends with a declaration of assurance. The One who created the heavens and the earth is also the Guardian of every step His children take.

"He will not let your foot slip; He who watches over you will not slumber." The image is tender yet powerful. While the world grows weary and anxious, the Lord remains ever alert. His care does not fade with time or distance. He neither overlooks our weakness nor abandons us in our trials. Day and night, His protective gaze rests upon His people.

"The Lord will keep you from all harm—He will watch over your life." This promise does not guarantee an absence of hardship but the continual preservation of the soul. God's keeping power surrounds our coming and going—both now and forever.

As we journey through today, we can overcome all uncertainties. We must fix our eyes and heart upon the Keeper who never sleeps. The Maker of heaven and earth walks beside us; His steadfast presence is our greatest help and eternal peace.

"I WILL NEVER LEAVE YOU NOR FORSAKE YOU."

"My God, my God, why have You forsaken me?" In this most poignant of prayers, we pray the prayer of Jesus on the cross lifted high, every bone out of joint, hands and feet pierced, back torn to shreds, limbs twisted, forehead bleeding, mouth dry and unbearably thirsty, sinking into the creeping darkness. Lament expresses the reality of suffering, the agony of life. And all the more, when the suffering is a direct consequence of obedience.

"But You, O Lord, be not far off; O You my help, hasten to my assistance." The Father is near even in this felt absence. Suffering for obedience draws out lament as prayer of enduring trust in the Father.

Lament gives us words when we cannot find words to express our anguish.

We pray Jesus' prayer to enter more deeply into the reality of the cross of Christ. We pray it also with the psalmist as the expression of his and our experience. Lament draws us into a deeper awareness of God, of our longing to do God's will and proclaim Him in the congregation. For the psalmist God has intervened. The cry for relief has purged the soul, leading to a vow of deepened obedience, generating redemption. Suffering provides a platform like no other for that self-forgetting prayer that worships Christ in His unique suffering whilst drawing out our deeper truer self, surrendered to oneness with our suffering Christ, a posture that leads to salvation for others and greater glory for God.

ENCOURAGEMENT AND CARE IN A PRAYER OF BLESSING

As we pray for others, what an encouragement it is to pray a blessing over them. This is exactly how John begins his letter to his dear friend, Gaius.

Gaius is facing a stressful challenge in the church. Yet before addressing the struggle, John cares for his friend first. His encouragement is heartfelt and genuine because, as his close friend, he knows Gaius' strong faith. Also, he acknowledges that fellow believers have witnessed Gaius' faithfulness and how he continues to walk in the truth (v.3).

John prays that all may go well for Gaius, including good health, just as it is well with his soul. John's words aren't just to flatter or spread cheer. He affirms Gaius' faithfulness to truth as what holds him regardless of the challenges that come his way. We bless others by telling them of the faithfulness we see in their lives.

What can a blessing mean to those around you? What does it mean to you? Just like John, the pen and paper await, or email, as it may be for us today. Or, as John writes in verse fourteen, the desire is to see him face to face. Who can you write a blessing to or invite to coffee and bless them in person? Ask God to show you who might need a prayer of blessing and speak life-giving encouragement over them.

Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

BE STRONG IN THE LORD

Being on Home Assignment can bring about some needed time for reflection. Recently, I was sharing about our ministry in Thailand and what a spiritual battleground it is we serve in. However, as I am home in the US, I find that the same kind of spiritual warfare is still very prevalent. In one of my recent quiet times, I was reminded of this passage in Ephesians that admonishes us to be strong and stand firm. It really does not matter what side of the ocean we are on and where we are. We are always going to be in conflict with spiritual forces in this world. But I was encouraged and reminded that I can be prepared for battle when I put on the armor of God. As I read these passages aloud, I could imagine myself donning the armor with its defensive and offensive weapons. I feel I have the courage to stand firm and resist the temptations of the devil and to fight for living a life of obedience and service in the Lord's army. I pray that each of us in our own way will acknowledge God as Lord of the universe and that he has given us the tools to be strong in the Lord.

REAPING IN THE LORD

Abounding grace, or as NIV says, abundant blessings. These four words show the heart of our God, He who is the God of sufficiency. We may habitually pray over our meals, and it is easy to pray for what we want from God. How often do we remember to ask the Lord to provide what we need and seek His blessing on what we're given? We may recognize the fruit we sow is a harvest of the hard work we put in. While God does request us to do everything as unto Him, the act of reaping is less about our work and more about our worship.

Do we remember to ask God to sow into our work so that we grow the fruit He desires, that which is healthy and thriving because of Him? The harvest is not determined by our physical capabilities or the resources in our pockets. The power of the Spirit is what takes the whole process from the beginning to the end.

As you reflect on your day, ask the Lord for what is needed to abound in good works today. Do you need an extra measure of patience? Is financial strain limiting your generosity? Is a lack of peace in a difficult situation distracting you from what God is asking you to do today? His grace abounds and His blessings are abundant. Invite Him into your work, asking for Him to show how His sufficiency is all that you need.

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SO MANY OPTIONS – ONE BEST PATH!

If your journey with Jesus has been anything like mine, there have been many opportunities to choose a path ahead that seems perfect, at least from my limited perspective. However, time and again, Father has graciously caused me to take pause and reconsider where I am to place my next foothold. That pause may come through a lack of unity with my bride, or that familiar stirring deep in my soul that reminds me to look UP before looking out.

In *Psalm 25*, as David reaffirms his trust in Father God, remembering and declaring the promises he has received throughout his life, he so perfectly models for us the posture of submission, inquiry, and humility – being willing to admit to both himself and to God that he does not know what is best. That uncertainty does not paralyze, but propels him into conversation and community with Father, the author of all Truth.

In verses 4 and 5, David implores Father to "Show me the right path, O Lord; Point out the road for me to follow. Lead me by your truth and teach me," This isn't a casual request for God to confirm the direction in David's own heart, but an active desire for intimacy – to more deeply understand Father's methods, character and will.

Are you facing a big decision, navigating a difficult relationship, or a prolonged season where clarity seems illusive? Take comfort in knowing that Father waits with the promise of Hope. Take a few minutes to pause and pray Psalm 25 – asking Him for the one best path forward!

LAMENT TO PRAISE: TRUSTING GOD'S UNFAILING LOVE

Most of the time I'm content, but every so often I slip into a funk. Last fall was especially hard. I experienced what seemed like spiritual warfare, and the weight of it was heavy.

Yes, I prayed for relief, but God seemed quiet. Over time, though, I shifted my focus away from my troubles and toward simply thanking God for who He is. "You are good, and what you do is good" (Psalm 119:68a). With each prayer of praise, He lifted me a little higher until I was finally pulled out of the «mud and mire."

As you read Psalm 13, notice the depth of David's despair. But then comes the turning point in verse 5: "BUT I trust in your unfailing love." Just like David, we face troubles, BUT we can trust in God's 'unfailing love' - His covenant faithfulness to Israel, to David, and to us. This promise is where our focus should rest. It's the ultimate mood changer.

Prayer: Lord, help us hold fast to who You are. On the days when we feel forgotten, when it seems like You've turned your back on us, or are giving us the silent treatment, give us the strength to praise You in the waiting, in the struggles, in the quiet. When we wrestle with our thoughts day after day, help us turn our eyes to You. May our hearts sing of Your goodness as we trust in Your unfailing love and rejoice in the joy of our salvation.

BLESSED TO BE A BLESSING

When Nancy and I boarded the plane to "go on mission" with TeachBeyond 14 years ago, we certainly had more questions than answers. We had said yes to God's call to Southeast Asia, but we felt, at least at a human level, completely unprepared, with limited knowledge of Asian culture, and, thankfully, no idea of what challenges lay ahead. All we had was a deep conviction that God was asking us to go. Looking back, we see that the prayers of others in the months leading up to this moment prepared us for this journey. The many friends, family, and church partners did not just pray for safety or success; they prayed that God would bless us, equip us, work in us, and through us for His glory. And He has, in ways we could never have imagined, opening doors, shaping our character, and giving us strength to accomplish His work.

This is the heart of Hebrews 13:20–21. This benediction is not a polite farewell; it is a bold prayer to the God of peace to actively transform lives. When we pray blessings, we are asking God to supply everything needed to do His will. In short, a prayer for blessing *is always asking for God's blessing to bless others*.

In a world that presses us to be independent and self-sufficient, our prayer for blessings reminds us that mission begins and ends with God's power. Therefore, let us be the kind of people who intentionally take moments each and every day to pray for God's power of blessing over each other so that we can be equipped for everything good and pleasing to God through Christ Jesus. This is my prayer for you today!

FRAMING OUR PRAYERS WITH WISDOM

When we were married, our officiant unknowingly left out the "for richer" portion of my husband's vows. Because everyone but him noticed, when it came my turn, I really exaggerated the "for richer," phrase, and may have rolled my eyes at, "for poorer." It was very funny, and maybe a little prophetic. We were already poor and about to give our lives on the mission field, although at the time it was supposed to be a four-year commitment. Here we are, sixteen years later, continuing to stand before God asking for our daily bread.

Agur's prayer reminds us where wisdom resides: It is a place of utter trust in the Provider, lest we take our lives into our own hands to meet our own needs and satisfy our own desires. He precedes the request for his daily bread with a plea that God would keep "falsehood and lies" far from him. From this place of protection he can then pray the prayers of his heart.

Lord God, protect our minds from the lies of our hearts, the lies of the world, the accusations of the wicked and those against your purposes. Keep us planted firmly in the adequate provision of Your Kingdom and help us to pray for our lives, our families, and our ministries, a prayer like Agur's: That You would help us walk in dependence upon You for all our needs, spiritual, mental, physical, financial...so that we and the story of our lives would honor Your Great Name.

AN IMPROBABLE JOURNEY

It was one of the last important steps in an improbable journey that had begun almost three years earlier.

In August of 2022, Black Forest Academy had been confronted with the daunting task of replacing two no longer sustainable dorms, with new government-regulation-compliant dorms, at an estimated cost of 10 million *USD*, without adding mission-crippling debt, and all before January of 2026.

Over the next two years, one apparently insurmountable obstacle fell after another. First a building became unexpectedly available that was perfectly suited to our needs, and at a cost that was significantly cheaper than even our optimistic estimates. Then political and bureaucratic barriers began to crumble, followed by unprecedented giving from the BFA global community. But one major hurdle remained.

KVJS, the government body responsible for residential schools in Germany, needed to approve the building and our proposed renovations. Just days before the 2025 graduation, the head inspector for KVJS arrived and we all held our breath. The hour-long tour through the site was full of questions from the inspector, some concerned expressions, and the occasional shaking of the head. Then, at the end of the tour, the onslaught of questions started.

"How did you hear about this building? Am I right that it will allow you to have three fully equipped dorms instead of two? And the town has been supportive of this project? And the school campus is how far from the dorm? 200 meters?" And on and on the rhetorical questions came. Finally, the inspector just shook his head and said, "It's as though this building was made for you. You are so LUCKY!"

Lucky is the only explanation that a secular bureaucrat could offer for the miracle that he had just witnessed, but we knew different. God's people had been praying and God had done it.

PRAYING FOR A KNOWLEDGE THAT TRANSFORMS

Paul's prayer for the believers in Ephesus provides us with an inspiring example. Rather than beginning with a list of material needs, he starts with a grateful heart, celebrating 2 essential marks of living faith: Trust in the Lord's will and love for one's brothers and sisters. This gratitude and trust are grounded in the first 14 verses, which provide a perspective on God's action and existence. It is this fixed gaze on God that compels Paul to trust, leading to gratitude.

Thus, his central request is not for deliverance from difficulties or earthly blessings, but that they may receive a 'spirit of wisdom and revelation'. The apostle's greatest desire is for them to know God in a more intimate, personal and transformational way. This wisdom transcends intellect; it is the spiritual ability to see life from God's perspective.

During these days of communal prayer, the greatest gift we can seek for ourselves and others is full knowledge of the glorious Father. It is through this growing relationship that all other areas of our lives find their true meaning and direction. We must also express sincere gratitude to our Father.

WHO IS MY HELP?

Verse 5 says "whose Help is the God of Jacob" (emphasis added). God is Help itself. And yet, so often, my heart seeks other help – other things, other people or (most often) myself and my own ideas.

This psalm calls us higher. After briefly warning us to not place our trust in anyone else, it turns our eyes toward God Himself, who is worthy of our total trust and all our praise.

All other objects of trust (including leaders, others, and ourselves) can do nothing to save; they and their plans will pass away. But God is different. He is the faithful, eternal, sovereign Creator King who saves us and acts for our good, thwarting evil. Only He can truly help.

The burdens listed here are heavy: oppression, hunger, prison, blindness, depression, living as a foreigner, fatherlessness & widowhood. In the midst of the pull to trust what we can see (instead of the God we can't) for help with our heavy burdens, verse 5 holds out a beautiful promise and call to us: "Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord their God."

Praise God we have Someone fully worthy of our trust and hope!

Where do you need God's help today? How are you tempted to place your trust and hope in something or someone less worthy? How have you seen God help and save you?

OVERWHELMED BY BROKENNESS, A LAMENT

I cried from my soul, "Hear me Jesus, hear my pleas for mercy." I was too overwhelmed to say anything else. I was holding my close friend, Barom, as he mourned the death of his son, unborn grandchild, and daughter, who had all died in quick succession. Barom's son, Maikel, had left his small village and gotten involved in criminal activity in the city and had been murdered! Barom's pregnant daughter, hearing the news of Maikel's death, had thrown herself to the ground in mourning, landing on her stomach. A few days later she suffered a miscarriage that didn't discharge properly and she died from sepsis shortly after.

I held Barom at a funeral for 3 lives lost. I was overwhelmed with the brokenness of the world, the senselessness of death, the loss of innocence, and the prevalence of sin. I cried a prayer of lament like I never had before. Psalm 130 had never felt so prescient.

Where do you turn when the depths crush you? When we are overwhelmed with the hurt around and in us, what do we do? We cry to God a prayer of lament, recognizing that if God counted our sins none could stand. But in all of this lament, there is hope! We never lose sight of the forgiving nature of our father Yahweh.

We feel the depths when in them, not numb to sin, but not letting it overwhelm us. We never lose hope, even in the pain. We wait. We hope in His Word. Our very soul, crushed by the hurt, waits. Imagine the night watchman. Longing for morning, when the darkness is overwhelmed by the light. When the sun brings clarity to the shadows. We pray the lament without losing the hope, we pray the condition without ever losing sight of the position.

PRAYER POWER

In these verses from James, the half-brother of our Lord, we see *prayer power*. Four things in relation to prayer power to draw from this passage: First, *prayer is important*. The scripture here teaches us that prayer is the way to overcome difficulties such as sickness and discouragement, or other needs. Second, *prayer is power*. By praying, we invite the Almighty God into our situation, and God's presence is power. Third, *prayer is, or can be, effective*. When we pray we get results. The effectiveness of prayer is based on our faith and in the goodness of God. As such, we pray confidently and we pray with expectation. And, fourth, confessing sin and forgiving one another are the *principles of prayer* which we need to abide by, in order to experience the power and the effectiveness of prayer. Therefore, we must seek victory over sin and we must live in forgiveness with one another. The good news is *prayer power is at everyone's disposal*.

- So, are you going through difficulties, such as sickness, loneliness, or discouragement? Take time right now to pray.
- Thank God for the mechanism of prayer through which we experience God's power.
- Think of the needs of someone, or of the ministry of TeachBeyond, and spend time praying for those needs.
- Is there unconfessed sin in your life? Confess it. Is there someone whom you need to forgive? Forgive them. Do you tend to struggle with forgiving other people? Pray for a forgiving spirit.

EYES ON HIM

There's something profoundly honest about this moment in Scripture. Jehoshaphat doesn't hide his fear. He doesn't mask his uncertainty with false confidence. Instead, he gathers the people and prays.

He stands before God and admits what many of us feel more often than we'd like to say: "We don't know what to do."

And then he does the one thing that makes all the difference—he lifts his eyes.

This is the posture of prayer: not performance, not control, but attention. Prayer begins not when we have the right words, but when we turn our eyes—our focus, our trust, our desire—toward God.

Sometimes, all we can do is look. And that is enough. This kind of prayer doesn't rush to fix, to plan, or to speak. It waits. It watches. It remembers who God is. It slows us down just enough to notice again the One who has been near all along.

When we begin with stillness—our eyes on Him—we start to see His presence in the ordinary. Our posture shifts, our hearts soften, and prayer becomes less about results and more about relationship.

If we could live from this place—eyes lifted, heart open—how might that reshape not just our prayers, but our whole way of being?

Today, pray not to be heard or to have answers, but simply to look. What might shift in you if you began every decision, every fear, and every joy by turning your eyes to Him?

FROM THE QUARRY TO THE CLASSROOM

In the heart of Livingstone, Zambia, lies a community called Ngwena, where Open Schools operates a vibrant program. We met several children who had previously worked alongside their parents at the local quarry, crushing stones to earn a living before joining the program.

One of our tutors, Gladys, leads a project with 60 children in and around her home. She stands as a testimony of hope, persevering through her own life challenges, to serve children who have never attended formal school.

Chilileko, an 11-year-old girl, joined the program without understanding a single word of English. Over the past 3 years, she has excelled tremendously and now stands ready to transition into formal schooling.

Living with her unemployed mother, Chilileko faithfully attends the Open Schools program every day. By the end of this year, she will be assessed for placement in a local formal primary school – likely entering at a grade beyond her age level, due to her remarkable progress.

Through the Open Schools program, we have seen how the power of poverty can be broken, one child at a time. Even more beautifully, we have witnessed the love of Jesus Christ expressed through these children as they perform short plays, sing songs, and recite Scripture with joy and confidence.

Just like His glory descended on the tabernacle where the Israelites would worship Him, so you are His temple – the place where His glory exists on earth in relationship with humanity. Not because of what we have done, but because of what Jesus finished on the cross!

Ask God to ground you in love, giving you a firm foundation that relies on His character and promises. Who is God? What is God like? How does God show His love to us?

As you reflect more on the character of the Lord, may you be reminded how wide and deep and long and high His great love and power is. Imagine something extending beyond the furthest star – that is a small example of how vast His love is for you, (insert your name here). Friend, I don't know what season you are in, but I hope through these words you will be encouraged that our Father is waiting, with His arms open for you to turn to Him. Take some time now in confession to be honest with God. Tell Him how you feel with raw emotion. Tell Him where you have gone wrong. Ask Him for His presence in the midst of what you are experiencing. Lean into the intimate presence of the Holy Spirit. Lastly, ask Him to restore the joy of salvation and for help to walk in obedience. 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BROKEN-HEARTED PRAYER

When was the last time you prayed with a broken heart? Maybe it was earlier today; maybe it has been a while. I've prayed with a broken heart for family, for friends, for my city, and for nations. It can be discouraging, and I'm still waiting to see answers I've longed for. How about you?

This is Jesus' last public prayer in the temple. His heart is to gather, to welcome, to protect. But the listeners, the nation, and even his closest friends will soon reject the invitation. Rejecting Jesus leaves heartbreaking desolation.

Jesus references Psalm 118, shouted by the crowds just days earlier as he entered Jerusalem, "Blessed is he who comes..." Yet even in the enthusiasm, there was no genuine welcome, no embrace of his invitation. They were not willing. They rejected the one who would become the cornerstone (Psalm 118:22–23).

A lament is Jesus' final word in the temple. In the very place built to reveal the glory, invitation, and provision of God to his people. So when you and I pray, we can continue to pray realizing that God too has prayed broken-hearted prayers. For you. For me. For those we love. For his kingdom to come and his will to be done. Even when it looks like it is being rejected and refused.

Who or what are you lamenting in prayer? Hold fast to your lament for them, and like the compassionate Servant-King, long to see them be gathered. What is your prayer of lament today?

KINDNESS THROUGH HIS GRACE

Knowing that I need not specific deeds, actions or outcomes; that there is not a chance, but a guarantee of this marvelous gift is almost overwhelming. When challenges arrive, I can be confident that God has a plan that is grander than I can imagine. Remembering this helps me rest in and accept the grace, mercy and peace that God has generously given me, which then encourages me to show more love to others.

BEFORE CALLING, ENCOUNTER

Many of us have asked God, "What is my calling?" and received only silence in reply. We feel that we pray, yet He does not answer. But what if His silence is an invitation to prioritise something we have not yet realised?

Isaiah had a personal encounter with the Lord that transformed his life (Isaiah 6:1). Such an experience is only possible when we dedicate ourselves to seeking true intimacy with God through prayer. When Isaiah saw the Lord in all His glory and holiness—and this was only possible

because he already had intimacy with Him—was that when God showed him what his calling, his mission? Was it? No! It was, in fact, when God showed Isaiah who he was. He made Isaiah see himself (Isaiah 6:5).

Encountering the holy God reveals who He is and who we are. His holiness convicts us of our sin, not to condemn us, but to redeem us (1 John 1:9). Before God can use us, He must break and purify us. Before we are sent out into the world, we are confronted. Isaiah was stripped of his ideas, his sense of righteousness and his titles, leaving only a contrite heart. However, the Lord purified Isaiah and transformed his impurities, giving him a new awareness of God's call to service (v. 8).

When we are close to God, He helps us to see ourselves and realise that we cannot fulfil His calling without first being transformed. If you already have a relationship with God and have allowed Him to reveal your true self to you and begin your transformation, continue to be attentive and prayerful, listening to the Lord.

If you have a relationship with God and have allowed Him to show you who you are and begin your transformation, remain attentive and prayerful, listening to the Lord.

In verse 8, God asks the prophet, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' He then waited for Isaiah's response before revealing His will. It was only after Isaiah's response that God revealed His will and sent him (Isaiah 6:9a). God appears to us, forgives us, relates to us, purifies us, transforms us, calls us and then sends us. If you are seeking your calling, stop seeking a mission. Seek the encounter.

AT HOME IN HIS SHADOW

To walk (or dwell/abide, as verse 1 says) in someone's shadow takes intentionality. If you've been on a walk with a friend, usually there is a little bit of space, and certainly you are not trying to walk in their shadow. Now imagine a young child, following a parent, trying to stay in his or her shadow. To walk in someone's shadow means walking closely to them, in step with them as they walk. What rhythms or practices help you walk closely with Jesus?

Charles Spurgeon writes, "The shadow of God is not the occasional resort, but the constant abiding place of the saint. Here we find not only our consolation, but our habitation—not only a loved haunt, but a home. We ought never to be out of the shadow of God." Home is where we are most at rest, where we can be ourselves and share what is most deeply on our hearts. What might you thank Him for or ask Him for as you rest in His shadow?

In the rest of Psalm 91, we see what happens when we "dwell in the shelter of the Most High." We have a loving Father who wants us to draw near to Him so that He can:

- Deliver us (v. 14)
- Protect us (v. 14)
- Answer us (v. 15)
- Be with us in trouble (v. 15)
- Rescue us (v. 15)
- Satisfy us (v. 16)
- Show us His salvation (v. 16)

HOW LONG?

"How long?" - The phrase "how long" indicated that a situation had been occurring for some time. The people of Judah continually ignored God's laws, and the prophet saw no end in sight.

Although the prophet was concerned about the future of Judah, he had a correct view of God. He was not complaining against God or criticizing God. Instead, he was asking God to act in the way He had promised to act. He brings his burdens to God in prayer, knowing that he could request God's help for relief. Habakkuk addresses God directly, wishing for Judah to become holy again and to fulfill its priestly function; he was saddened to see the exploitation of others in place of love.

As a committed servant, Habakkuk believed that God would not allow wicked people to dominate Judah. As he continued to observe the iniquity and injustice in the land, he asks God: "Why do you make me see iniquity and look at wrongdoing?".

It is very difficult to deal with the time and the silence of God. On most occasions, we are neither prepared nor mentally ready to wait indefinitely. Our lament wants to be relieved immediately. We question, as the prophet did, without understanding that our time is not God's time and what we want to hear is not always what God has to tell us. Our dissatisfaction and discontent may even be justifiable, and our lament certainly will be heard and understood by the Lord. However, we need to add to all this a generous dose of faith, hope, and rest in God's timing, will, and sovereignty. In His time and in His gentle and wise way, God reveals everything, teaches everything, and consoles everyone.

JESUS IS PRAYING FOR YOU

Jesus prayed for protection from evil (vv. 15-16)

The reality of living in this world confronts us daily. Our brokenness echoes when we see abuse of power, injustice, calamity, corruption, and blatant evil. Our hearts ache for an end to it all, and yet we remain *here*. Jesus, who could remove us from the world, instead prayed that the Father would keep us and protect us from the evil one. He knows exactly what we face. And He reminds us: "We are not of the world." That is deeply encouraging. This world is temporary; our true home and eternity are with Him. Protection does not mean escape from hardship but preservation in it, kept by God in the midst of *it all*.

Jesus prayed for sanctification in the truth (vv. 17, 19)

Our world is saturated with lies. Jesus' prayer for our sanctification in the truth is profoundly relevant. God's Word is truth, living, reliable, and timely. As we read and receive it, the Spirit uses the Word to renew our minds, reorient our desires, and correct the lies we have believed. In Christ's self-giving ("I consecrate myself"), we are set apart to belong to God and to reflect his character.

Jesus prayed for our holy mission (v. 18)

"As you sent me into the world, so I have sent them." We are not spectators, but we are sent people. This mission takes shape in ordinary places, at home, at work, in our neighborhoods and classrooms, bearing witness to Jesus with integrity, love, and truth.

Even in education, we participate in God's work of forming minds and hearts that know and love what is true.

Lord, thank You for seeing our need and keeping us from the evil one. Guard us moment by moment. Sanctify us by Your truth, Your Word is truth. And send us into Your holy mission with courage and compassion, to reach the nations through education. In Jesus' name, amen.

Ponder: What breath prayer do you often repeat? A breath prayer is a Bible phrase that helps you focus on God in the moment. You intentionally speak this phrase to remind yourself that God is God and He is here.

Scripture

And Mary said:

What do you know about this person's situation when they are praying this? What does this prayer mean for the person praying? What phrase in their prayer stands out for you? Can this be a breath prayer for you?

GOD'S UNEXPECTED PRIORITIES

In Luke 1, God answers the prayers of an old woman who *couldn't* have a child, a prayer that Elizabeth and Zechariah may well have stopped praying long before it was answered. Then He sends a messenger to a common girl in a common place who shouldn't have a child, at least in the ordinary way, and tells her that all things are possible with God. Mary believes, and as she hears the prophetic words of Elizabeth, she erupts in a song of praise.

Mary, a humble, common girl, rejoices in God's loving attention. All proceeding generations will call her blessed. She focuses on God's unexpected priorities: The rich and powerful are scattered, brought down, and sent away empty. The poor and humble are seen, lifted up, and filled with good things. And all those who are Abraham's children by faith are remembered by their covenant-keeping God. This is how God works.

Jason Mandryk of Operation World reminds us: "If our ministry's success were dependent on our organizational systems or how much money we throw at a problem, then we would be failing all the time. Success is based on the power of God at work in the nations. That means that no matter how new we are, how poor we are, how illiterate we are, how alone we are, we have access to the power that actually brings about change." Let us humbly come before the God of Mary, who is also our God. He delights to come to the aid of those who realize they have nothing but He has everything.

A DAILY BECOMING

Ever heard of Schrödinger's cat?

In the 1930s, Erwin Schrödinger, an Austrian physicist, used the thought experiment of a poor little cat in a box with a deadly but unpredictable poison to help explain the idea that multiple possible realities co-exist, until observed. The box contained both a live cat and a dead cat at the same time, but when the box was opened, one of these scenarios ceased to exist leaving only the one we see. I always hoped the cat made it.

Psalm 37:4 says, "Delight in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart." It took me a while to read this as, "When I focus on my relationship with God, and being who he wants me to be, then my desires begin to align with his will." This is not about getting anything I want, but receiving what is truly best for me.

So my story of transformation is the slow and ongoing one God is working in me over the years, as I live through this verse, becoming increasingly joyful in the seasons I am in.

For this, I daily praise God.

There may or may not have been multiple possible versions of me, or indeed you - a disturbing thought right there - but the only one that exists in the present is the one that made multiple small decisions to delight in the Lord, allowing Him to gently bend my will to His. This is not subjugation, but freedom.

For this, I daily praise God.

Colossians 1:9-12

First, listen for what this prayer says to you. Insert your name and imagine someone is praying this for you. Read the verses again slowly. What message do you hear?

PRAYER WARRIORS

In reading the letters of St. Paul, I am often challenged by 2 things in particular. The first of these is how often he tells the readers how he has not stopped praying for them, and sometimes this is only since hearing about their faith but not having met them. The second challenge is the specific prayers he prays. Here, he prays that the Colossians will be filled with knowledge and understanding, that they would be strengthened with power and that they would be blessed with endurance and patience. It humbles me when I think about the regularity and substance of my own prayers for those congregations I minister to.

I recall a few years ago when my home church had a 24/7 week of prayer, where people signed up for hour slots across the week. I took the early morning slots, 2am, 3am or 4am. The church had created and still runs a prayer room, filled with creative ways to pray. One such way was to write down our prayers. I remember being very much challenged by the written prayers of many who would not be front of house people, those who would be much too shy to speak with any confidence of their faith. I was humbled and challenged by the depth of love in those prayers, prayers of people much simpler than myself, prayers of people I had underestimated in the high opinion I had of myself. My prayer life changed forever after that week and the peep into the prayers of my humble brothers and sisters.

FOREVER KNOWN, NEVER ALONE

Can you name 20 things about someone special to you? This was recently asked of *our 3rd and 4th graders. It was easy for them to name* 10 things, but naming 20 became more difficult. Then they were asked to name even more... what about 2,000 things? I'm *not sure I could name* 2,000 things about myself!

But our Creator can. He knows everything about you. He knows when you sit down and when you rise. He knows your thoughts and your words before you even speak or take action. He knows everything about you—and He still comes for you. You can't escape Him. He is everywhere. He is present in the good, the bad, and the ugly.

He walks with you through your entire life: in all the great moments and memories, in the moments you feel alone, and in the times you think you've messed up beyond repair. We can lift our heads high because the Creator of the universe not only *knows us completely but loves us unconditionally*. There is nothing that can separate us from His love!

Father, thank You for knowing me so completely and still choosing to love me. Reveal Your presence in the good, the bad, and the ugly to me. Guide me along the path You have laid out for me. Show me Your thoughts and Your way, and lead me in Your everlasting way. Thank You for creating me – a light to shine in the darkness. Amen.

Ponder: Jesus lovingly touched many and brought healing. Think of some Bible people Jesus healed.

Scripture

Read Psalm 88

First, think about your own life and relationship to God. Read the lament again and pay attention to what stands out for you. Read it again and open your heart for Jesus' touch. Palms open to receive.

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LAMENT OF DARKNESS

Where is the darkest place you've ever been? A cave? The Wilderness? A windowless room?

When was the darkest period of your life? After a loss? During transition? When caught in a sin?

The Bible shows us what to do in those dark places - cry out to God! This is the nature of the lament Psalm - a unique form of prayer.

Though raw and full of complaint, most end with a glimmer of hope. But not Psalm 88. In Hebrew, it literally ends with the word *darkness*, the Psalmist naming it as his only remaining friend.

I encourage you to read Psalm 88 again. What words and images does Heman, the writer, use to describe his anguish? Who does he hold responsible? For instance, in verses 10–12 he argues that he would be useless to God if dead. It's interesting to note that Heman was compared to Solomon in his wisdom (1 Kings 4:31), was a leader in Israel's worship (1 Chronicles 16:41–42) and was under the direct supervision of King David (1 Chronicles 25:6). If he can do some *holy complaining*, so can we. Use his words, or make up your own, to create a personal lament regarding a dark place in your own life. Be honest. Don't hold back. Cry out to God.

WE DO NOT WALK ALONE

The blessing of the Apostle Paul captured/expressed in 2 Corinthians 3:14, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all," comes to us like a trinitarian embrace that sustains daily scholastic life. In the midst of daily challenges, full classrooms and noisy school yards, this blessing reminds us that we do not walk alone: The grace of Christ lifts us, the love of the Father defines our identity, and the communion of the Spirit unites us.

The grace of Christ invites us to begin again: to look at every student, teacher, and family through His eyes, with mercy, forgiving the imperfect and celebrating the little things. The love of the Father affirms us in our identity: We are His beloved children, with the call to be instruments of His love through our words and actions, so that every person feels valued and cared for. As well, the communion of the Spirit teaches us to nurture unity through listening, serving, and making each decision with discernment and wisdom from above.

Today we take a pause, we breathe deeply, we draw close to our God in prayer as if sitting at the table with a friend. We present our challenges, joys, fears, and dreams before the God that sustains us. We ask that the grace of Christ dismantles our hardness of heart, so that the love of God can heal our wounds and that His Holy Spirit can renew our unity in the educational mission we have.

May this blessing serve not only as a liturgical greeting, but a daily lifestyle: when opening a notebook, entering the classroom, grading an assignment, beginning a meeting, or walking through life with someone.
